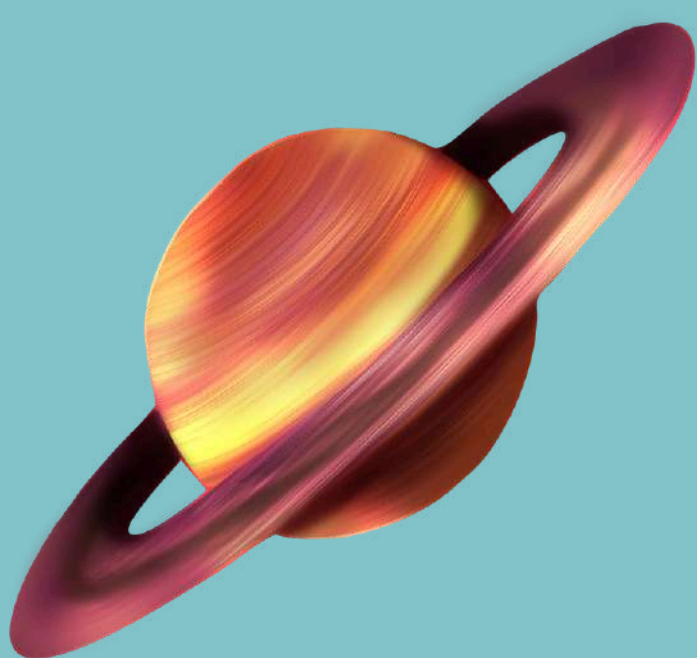
On 2nd August 2025, the Astronomy Club organized an engaging and educational activity centered around the observation of sunspots. Held within the school premises, the event saw enthusiastic participation from club members across various classes, under the guidance of the faculty in charge. The primary objective of the session was to study sunspots – dark, cooler areas on the Sun's surface caused by intense magnetic activity – and to understand safe methods for observing them. The activity not only deepened students' knowledge of solar phenomena but also promoted awareness of proper solar observation techniques.

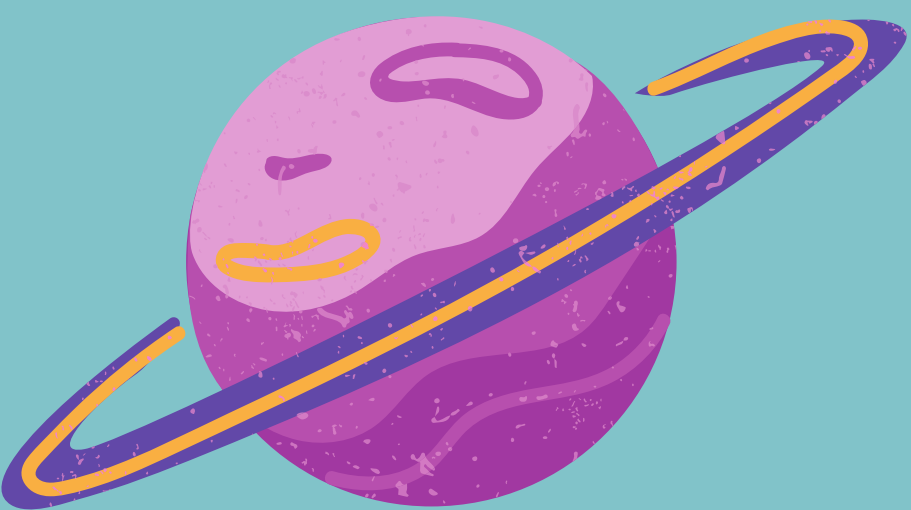
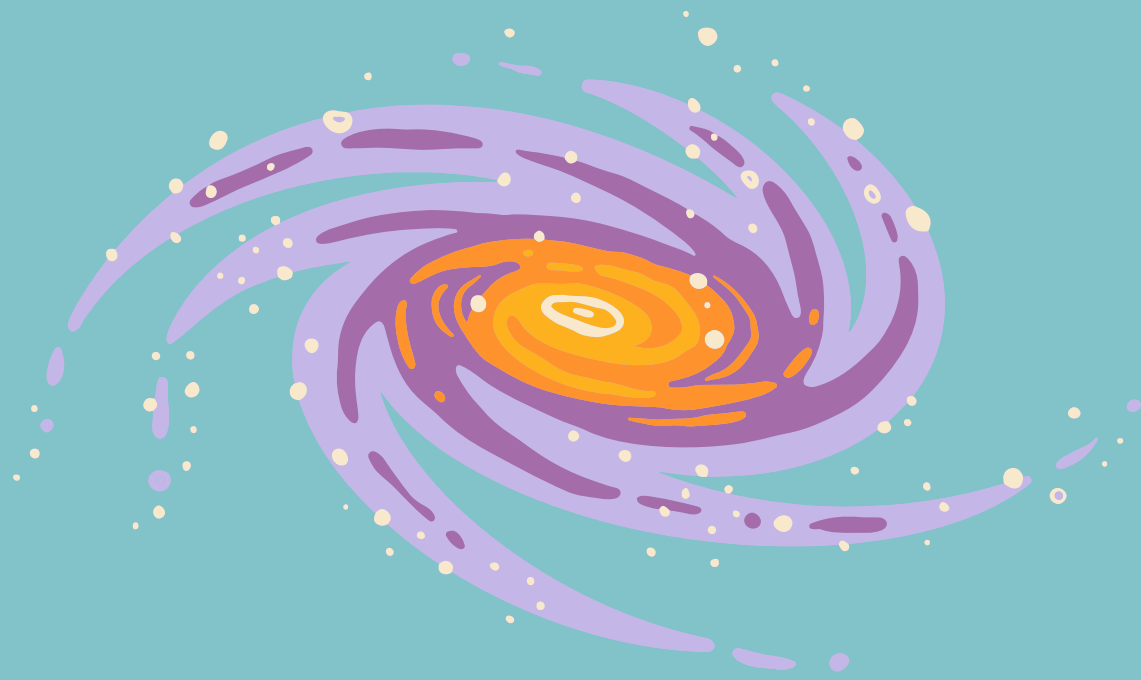
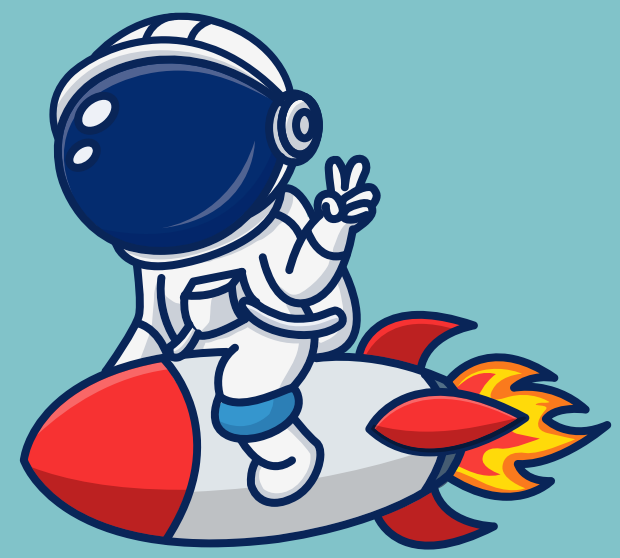
This activity was guided by our teachers, Mr. Karthick, Ms. Janet and Ms. Rama who helped us operate the telescope and understand the observation process.


Instead of using solar filters or viewing the Sun directly, students employed a specially designed mirror combination telescope. This instrument reflected sunlight and projected it onto a black sheet of paper, enabling a safe and effective method for solar observation. The setup ensured complete eye protection while providing a clear and detailed image of the Sun's surface. On the paper screen, students could clearly identify sunspots as small, dark patches. They took turns observing the projection, carefully noting the number and position of the sunspots, and eagerly discussed their observations with great enthusiasm.

After the live observation, a video session was held in which students watched educational clips explaining what sunspots are. The videos also helped them understand how sunspots can affect Earth's space environment and even communication systems.

Plants are the living legacy of our ancestors, a testament to their knowledge and traditions

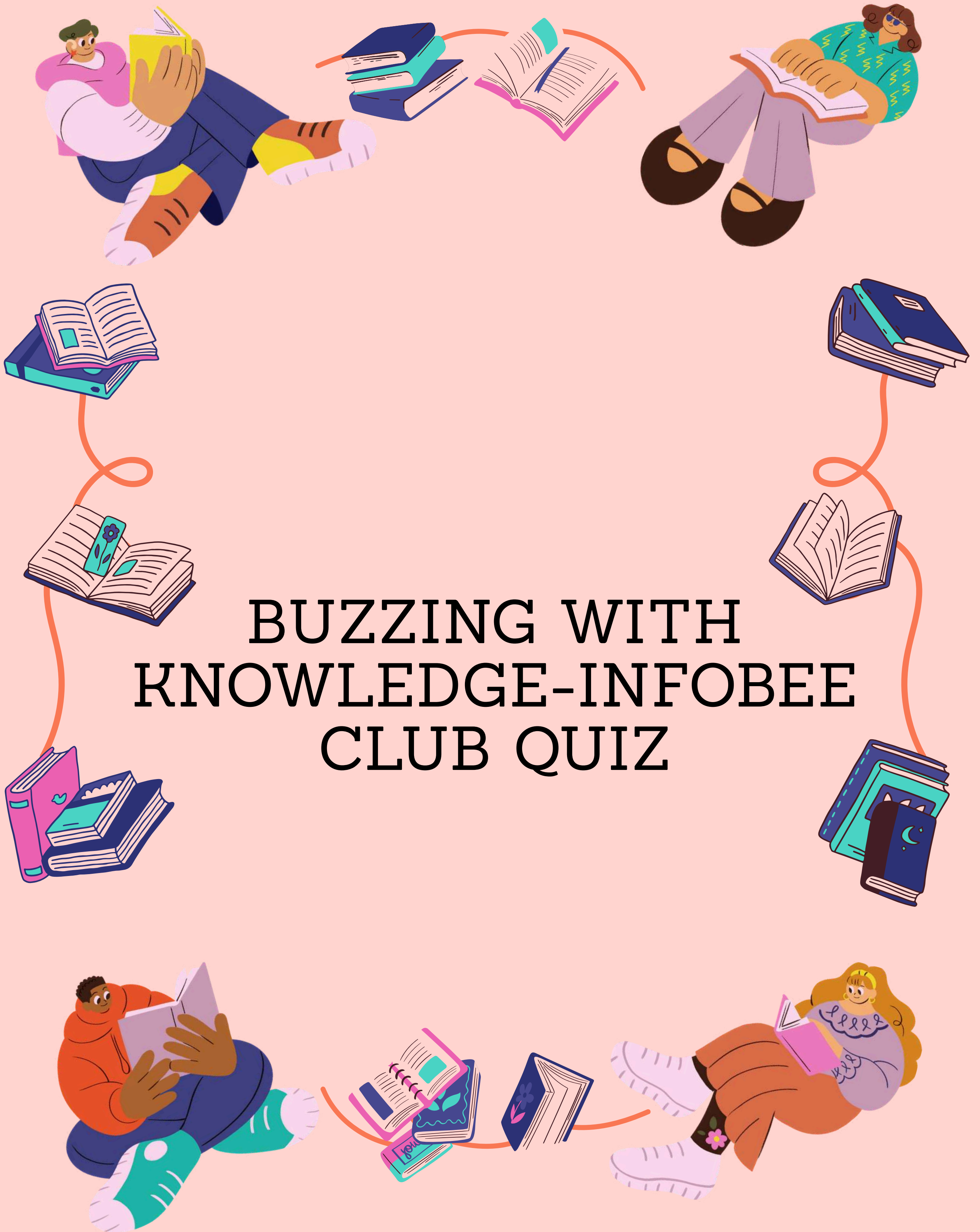

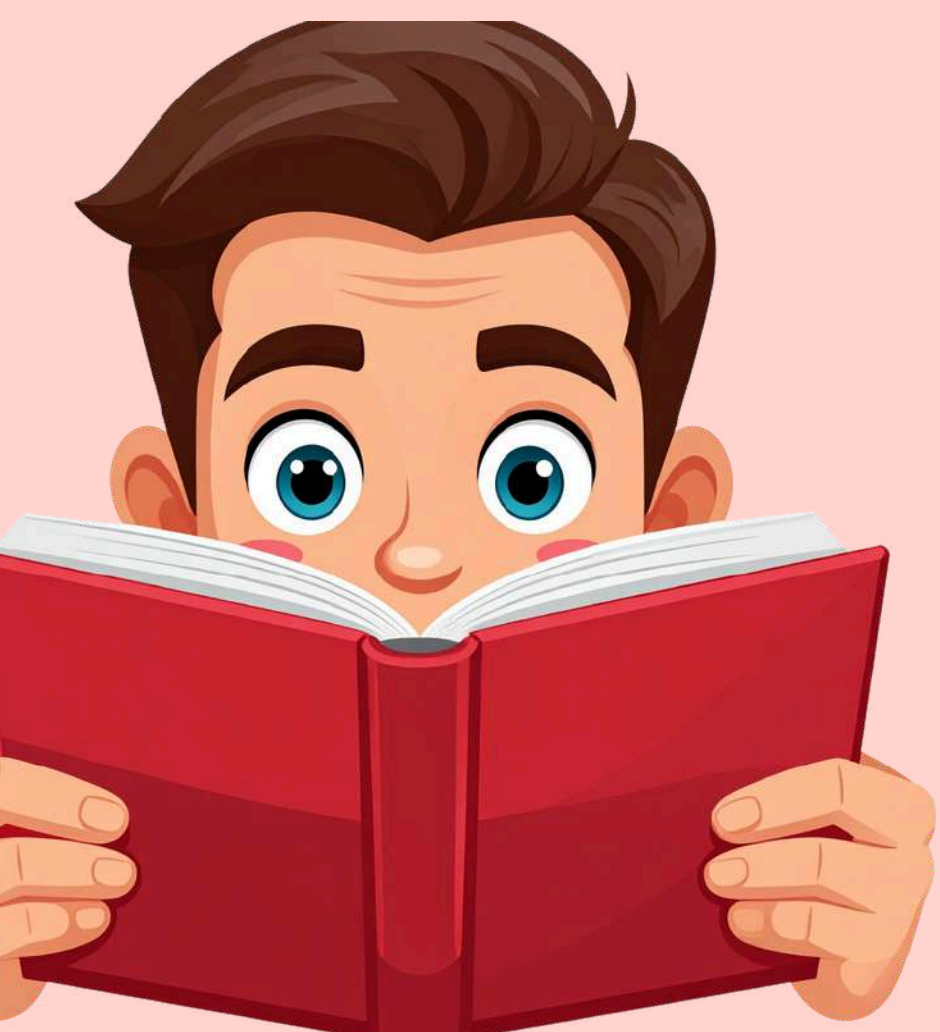

The quiz proved to be a perfect blend of fun and learning. It challenged the students' minds while building bonds among participants from different classes.

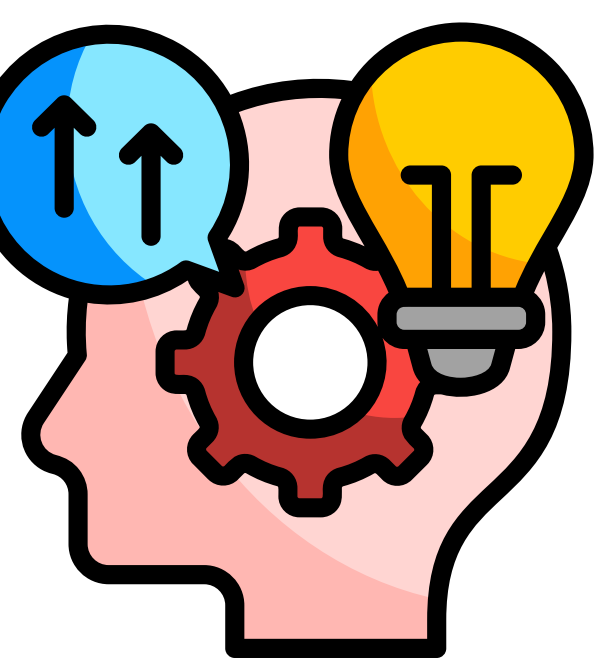
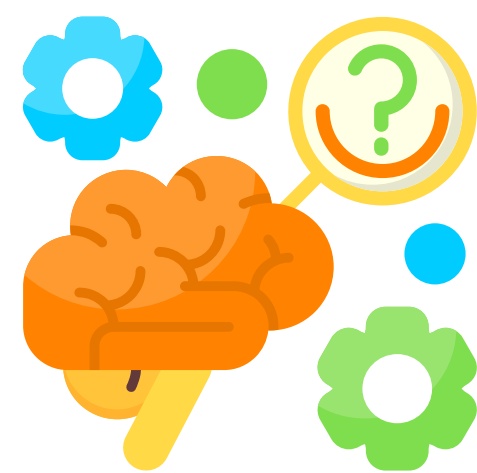

As part of the IAYP programme, students from T.I. School volunteered at Sir Ivan Stedeford Hospital, gaining a real-world view of healthcare.

In the Dialysis Unit, they observed patients undergoing treatment for kidney issues and felt the emotional atmosphere. They also assisted a pediatrician, getting a glimpse into child healthcare and how doctors interact with young patients.

The Radiology Department captured the students' interest with its advanced imaging technologies, including CT scans and MRI machines. They learned that CT (Computed Tomography) scans use X-rays and computer processing to produce detailed 3D images of the body's internal structures. MRI (Magnetic Resonance Imaging) machines use strong magnetic fields and radio waves to generate high-resolution images of soft tissues and organs. These layered visuals help doctors detect abnormalities such as tumors, internal bleeding, or neurological issues without invasive procedures. The students were fascinated by how such technology supports accurate diagnosis and treatment planning.

At the Gynecology Department, the students of T.I. School observed how doctors care for women's reproductive health. They witnessed consultations and learned about treatments for various conditions like menstrual disorders and pregnancy-related issues. The visit gave them valuable insights into the compassionate and specialized care provided to female patients.

Along that, they observed the heartbeat of the child and interacted with the Dr. Nazreen (Gynecologist) about avoiding junk food and eating healthy food in order to reduce the risks in future and to lead a healthy lifestyle.

The students along with the staff members helped to guide the patients to the Diabetic Clinic and helped children to check their weight.

At the Diabetic Clinic, they diligently maintained patient logs with great care, taking on a small yet meaningful task that helped lighten the workload for the busy staff. By the end, the students walked away with more than just knowledge — they gained hands-on experience and a deeper understanding of compassion and service.

On the 12th of August, T.I. School conducted a heart-warming initiative called "Kids to Kids Contribution", aimed at instilling values of sharing and compassion among students. Pupils from classes 1 to 12 enthusiastically took part in this noble cause by donating essential groceries and funds to support underprivileged children.

The collection drive began promptly at 9:40 a.m. during the first period. Students of Class 11 took the lead, moving through the classrooms to gather the donations. They also undertook the responsibility of sorting the groceries and counting the monetary contributions. Their teamwork and dedication ensured the smooth organization of the items.

The response from the students was overwhelming. The items collected included: Rice (9 kg), Toor Dal (26 kg), Moong Dal (15 kg), Urad Dal (16 kg), Groundnut (13.6 kg), Fried Gram (7 kg), Jaggery, Sugar, Onion, Garlic, and various spices like Coriander, Cumin, Turmeric, and Red Chillies.

Cooking essentials such as Oil (10.6 litres in total), Ghee (1 litre), Crystal Salt (3 kg), and Gingelly Oil (1 litre) were also included.

Additional food items like Refined Wheat Flour, Semolina, Chickpeas, Vermicelli, and Coriander seeds were generously donated.

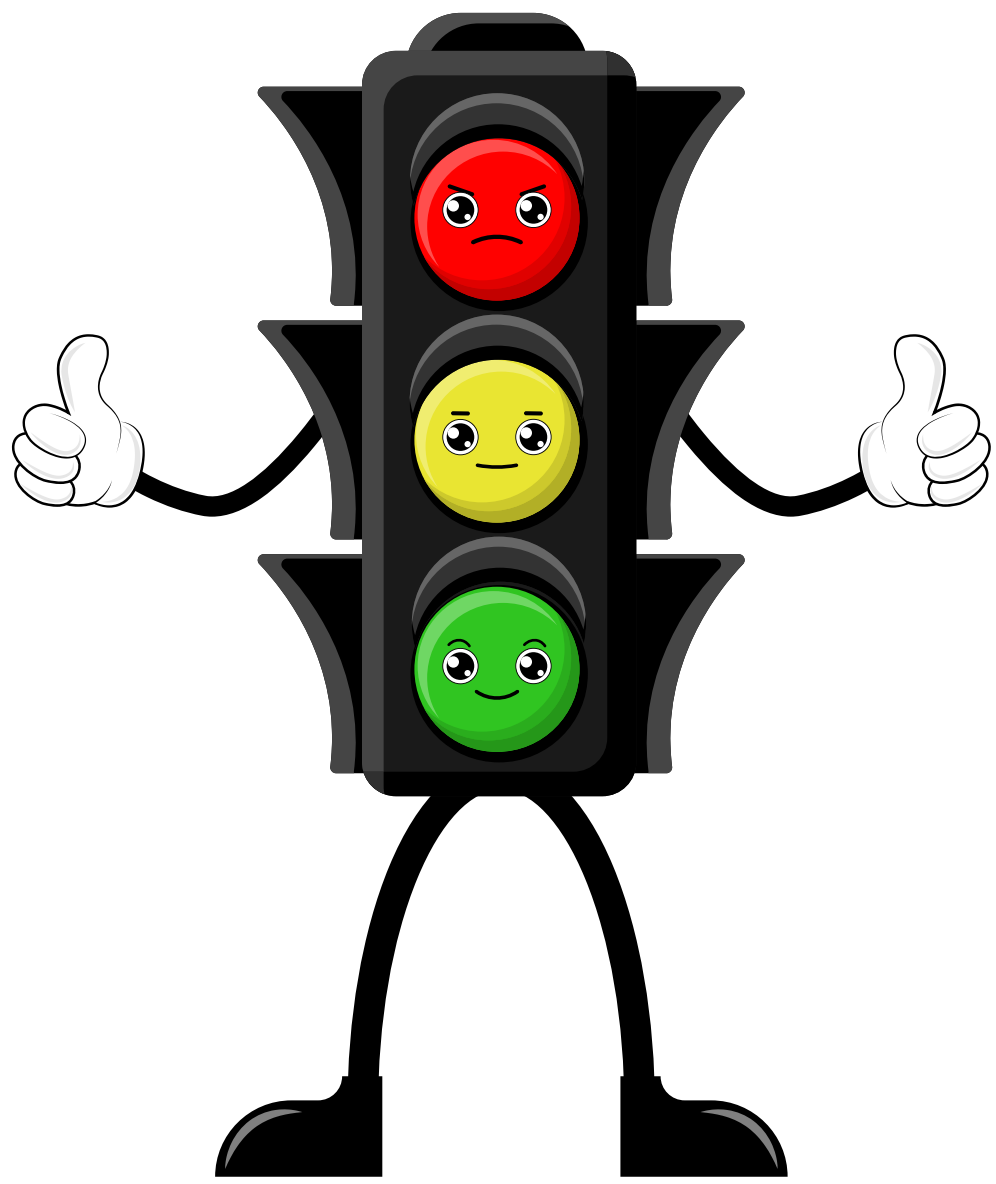

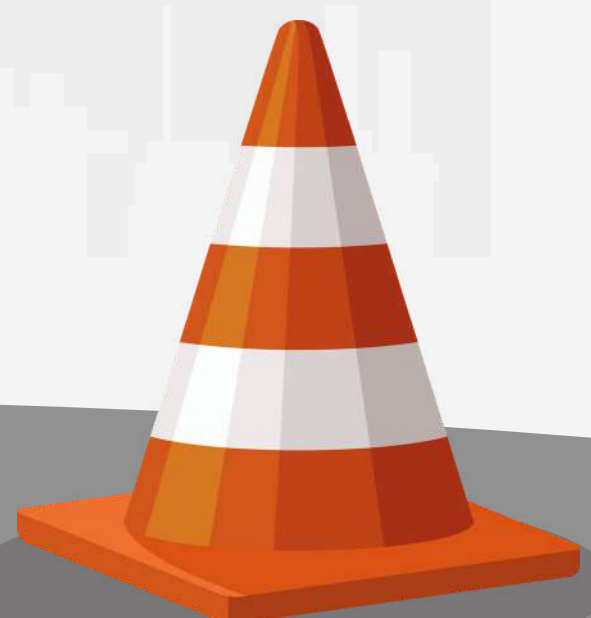
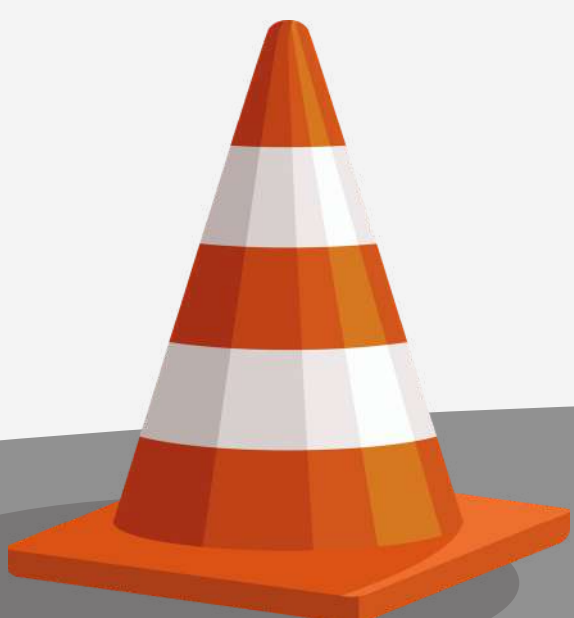

SAFETY UNDER THE

PROGRAM ON TRAFFIC

“EVERY CRASH IS A STORY OF A LIFE CHANGED FOREVER.”

On 12th August 2025, our Grade 9 Road Safety Patrol members joined an online workshop under the Student Outreach Program on Traffic Rules. It was organised by the Muskaan Foundation for Road Safety, and the guest speaker was Ms. Neha Khullar, Director (Projects and Training) of the foundation.

Ms. Khullar is a passionate advocate for road safety. She has worked closely with accident survivors, police officers, and government officials, fighting to make roads safer. She has led campaigns to fix dangerous spots, promote helmet and seatbelt use, and ensure that traffic laws are enforced. Her words were not just statistics, they were calls for action. She revealed that India faces 4,61,312 accidents every year, claiming 1,68,491 lives and injuring over 4,43,000 people. Highways, though only five percent of the road network, account for sixty-one percent of deaths. Most fatalities, sixty-eight percent, occur in rural or outer areas, often involving pedestrians, cyclists, and rickshaw pullers.

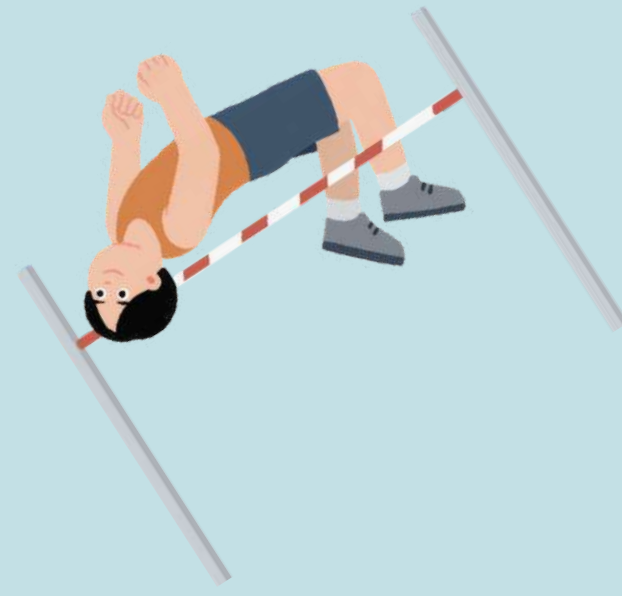
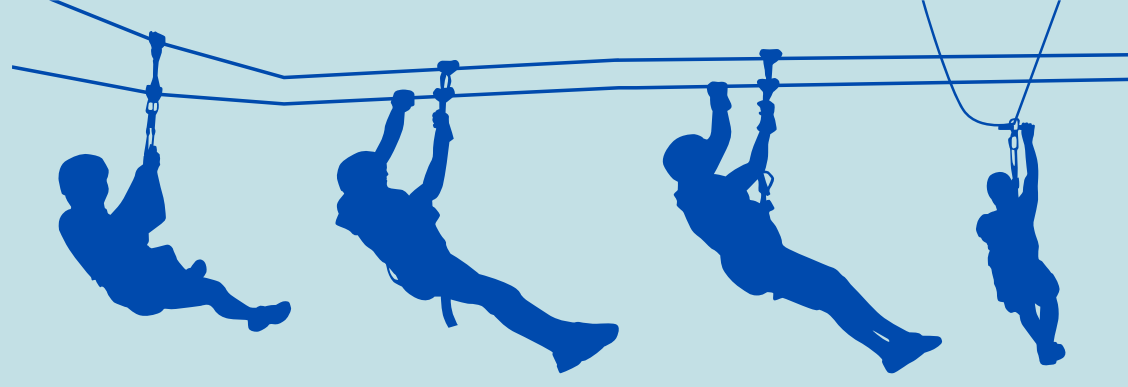
She painted a haunting picture: vehicles crushed beyond recognition, parents waiting for children who will never return, survivors who replay the crash in their minds night after night. Some drivers walk away alive, but the friends or family who travelled with them never do, and the weight of that loss makes them feel responsible for the rest of their lives. Families are left not only with grief but also with medical bills that can push them into debt. The causes, she said, were often simple but deadly. Drivers without proper training, distractions like mobile phones or casual conversations, drunk driving, and reckless speeding all turn roads into danger zones. At 60 km/h, a crash feels like falling from the fourth floor; at 100 km/h, like falling from the tenth.



She also explained India's road safety laws, from the Motor Vehicles Act to rules against rash driving and drunk driving, as well as licence procedures and strict penalties for underage driving. The session ended with her challenge to us: become road safety ambassadors, carry the message to others, and remember that every single choice we make on the road can either save a life or destroy one forever.

MILES OF LEARNING: GRADE 6 TRIP TO ROCKSPORT SOLLANUR



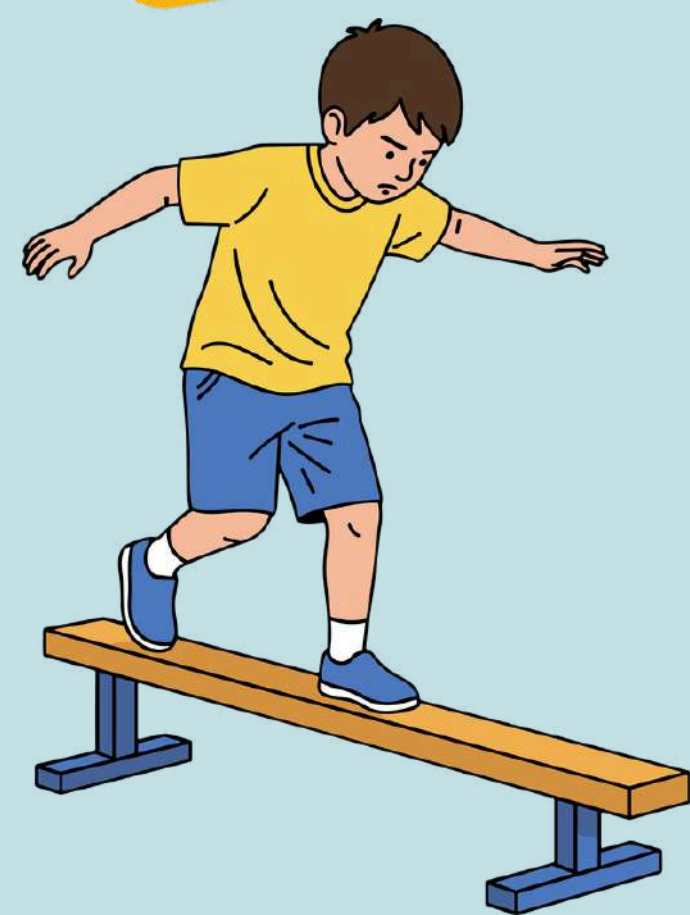

KRISHNA JAYANTHI CELEBRATION



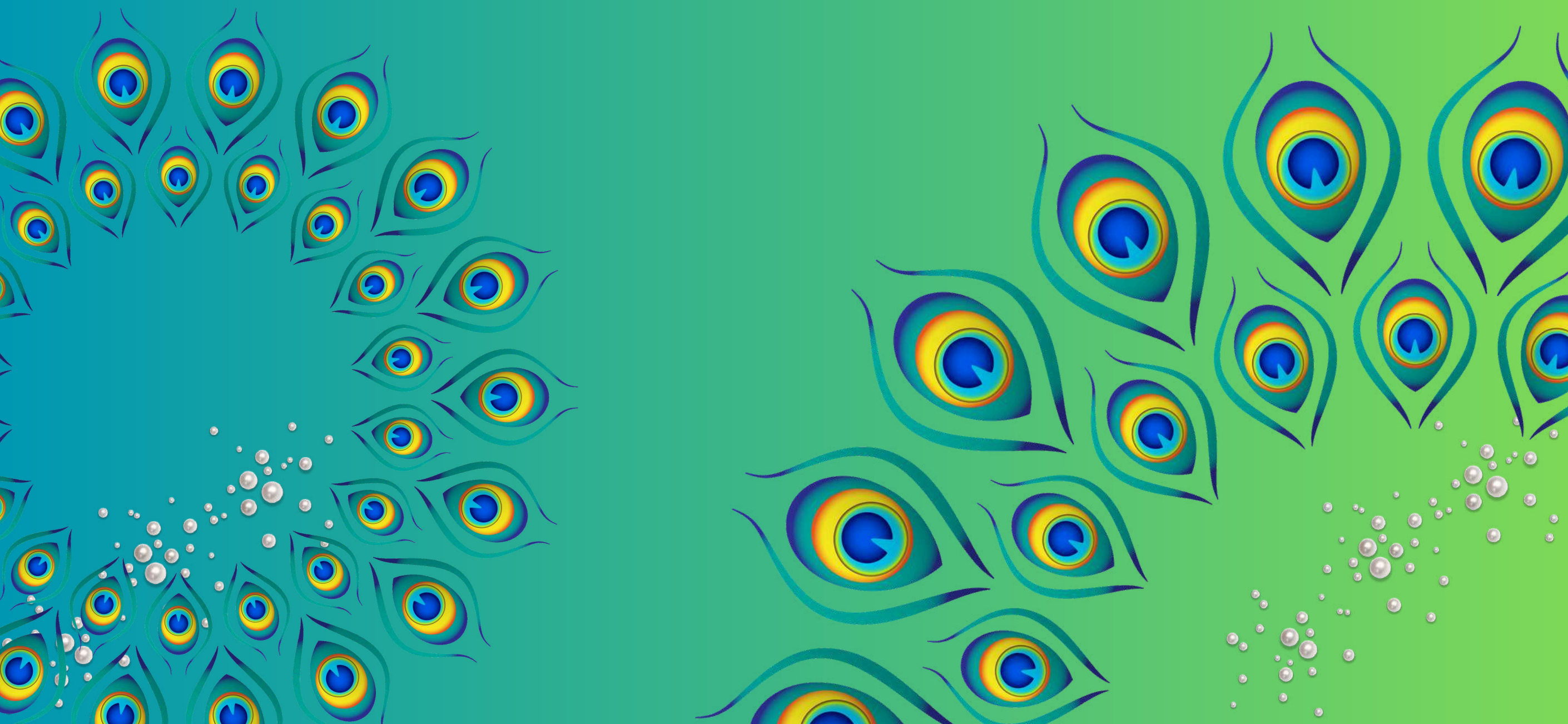

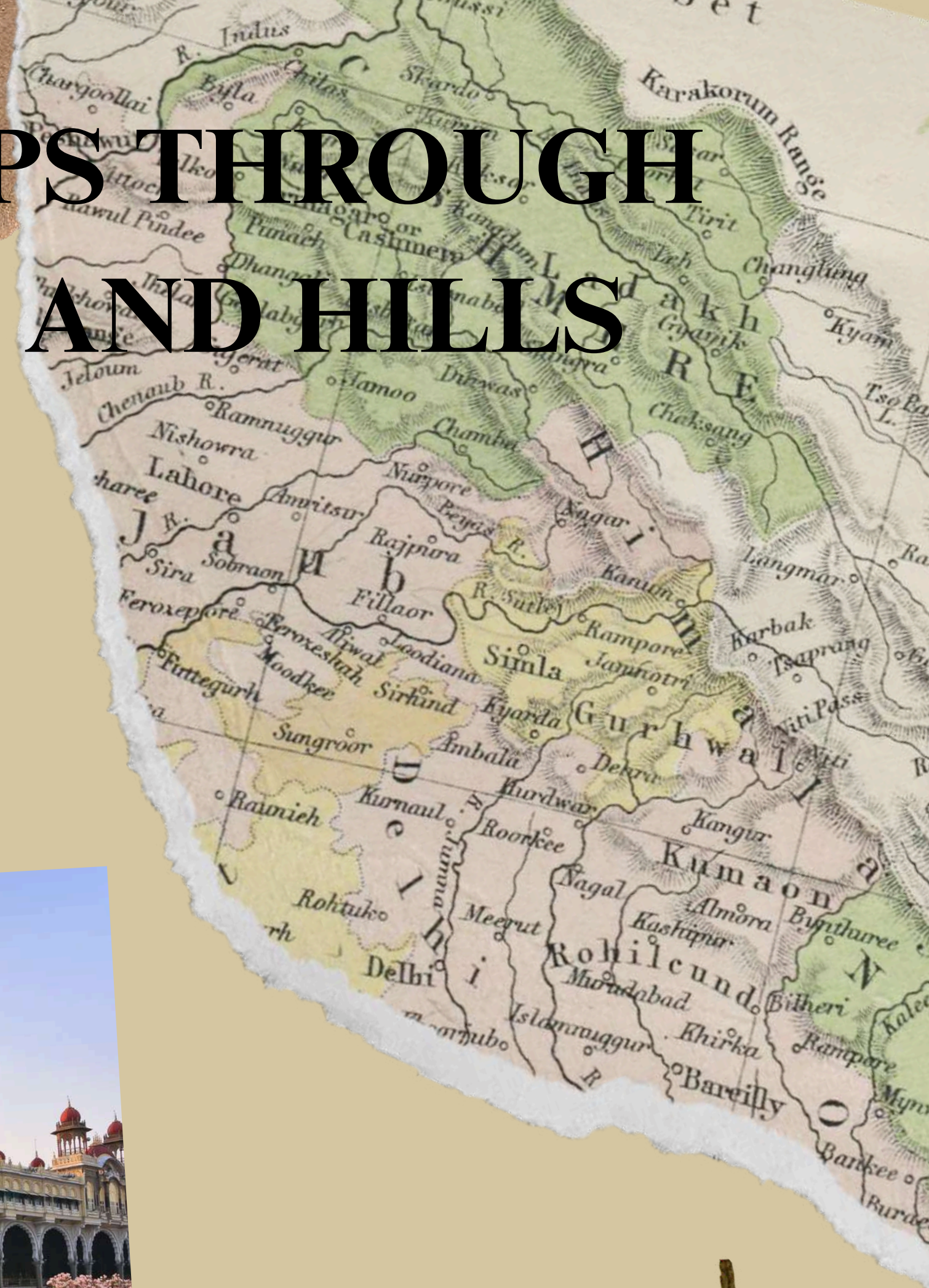
Following the video, the Club President gave a short talk explaining the vital parts of a camera, helping students better understand how their equipment works and how to use it effectively for macro shots.

The event was successfully conducted under the guidance of the Astronomy Club President, Saptharishi, and the Deputy President, Nalavenba, with support from

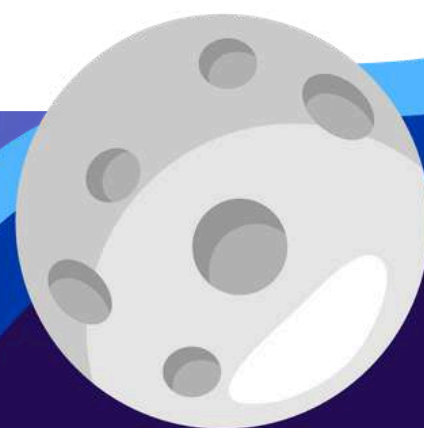
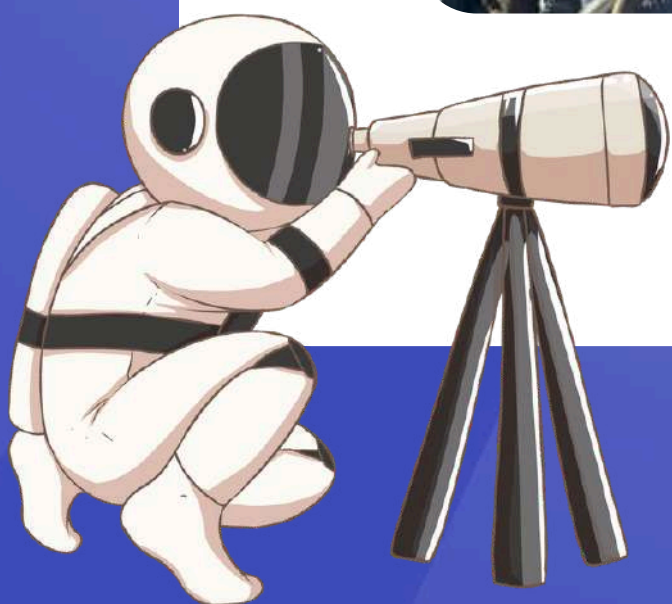




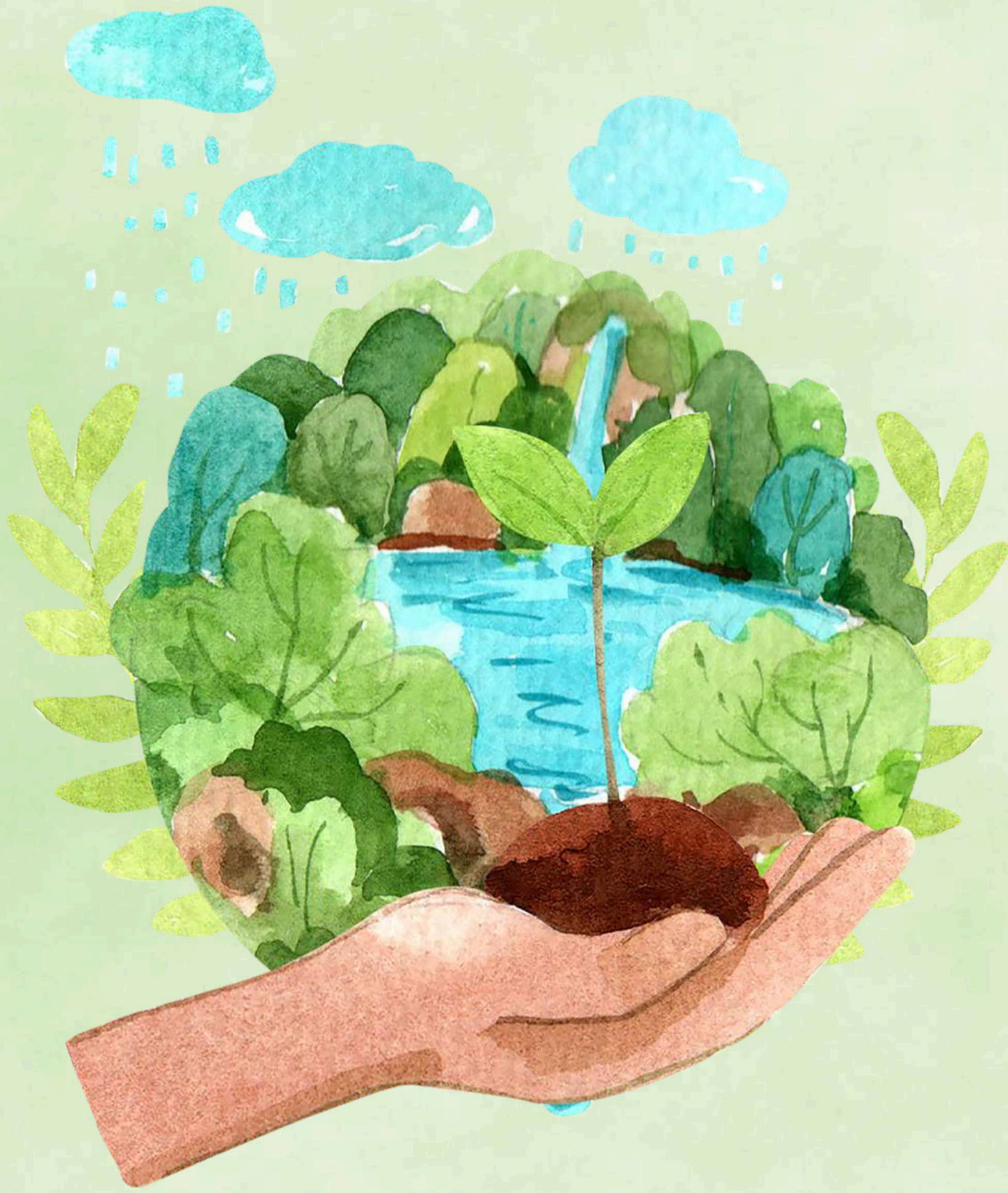
As Art for Change concluded, one thing was certain: every participant walked away not just with an artwork, but with a memory—vivid, empowering, and beautifully unforgettable.

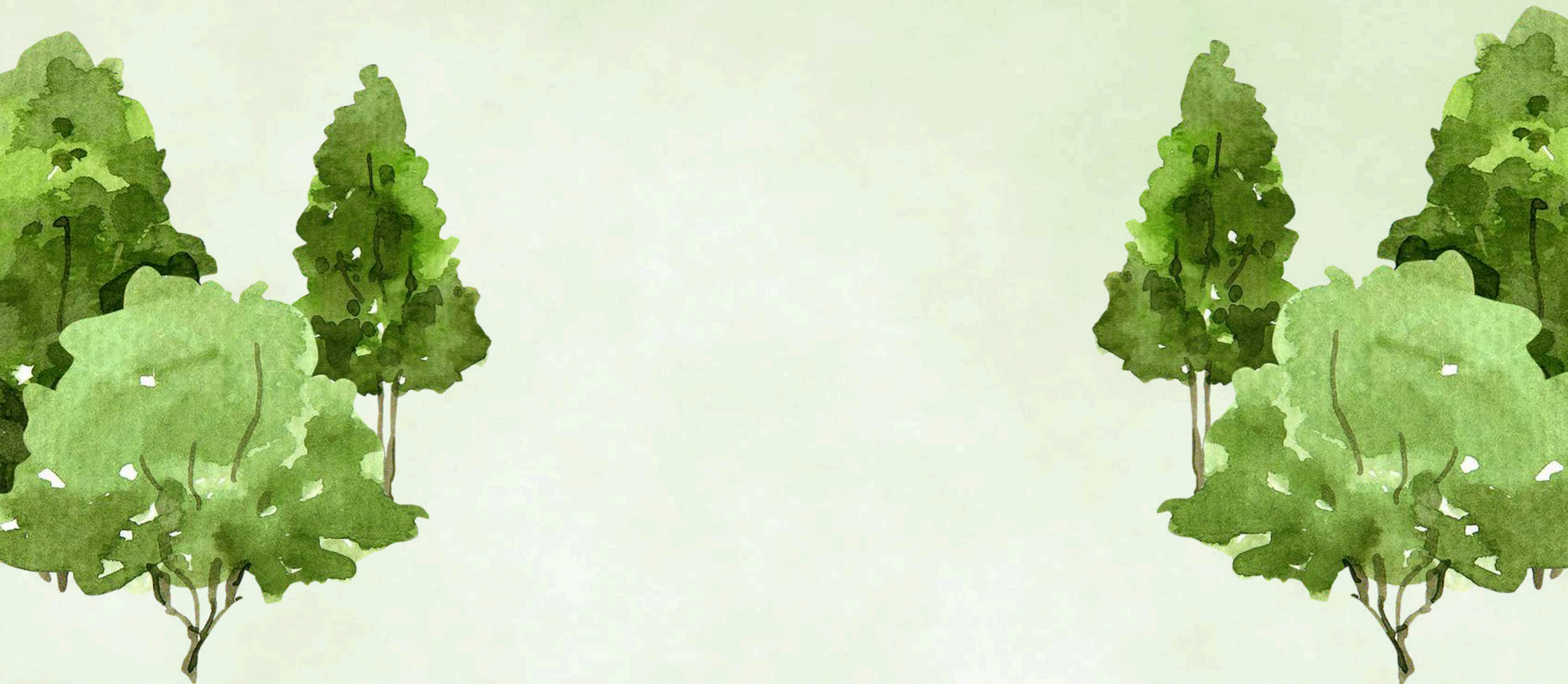

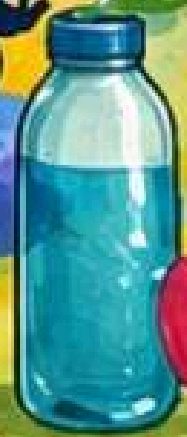

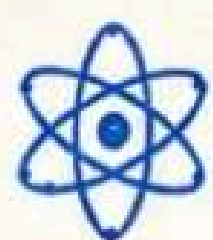
